Elaine learned that one of the Project Seed students had attend Tech Trek (**Isabel Mitchell** 2015 Hercules) and invited me to hear her present her Chevron research project, Evaluation of Specific Aspects of Lubricants/ Lube Additive Performance Using Bench Test Apparatus. Isabel was confident, competent, and articulate. She deftly answered questions from the chemists in the audience. Afterwards I asked her if and how Tech Trek was a stepping stone. She said that we gave her the opportunity to have a college experience.
