Directions: To get to the Walentas' home at 737 Bay Tree Lane, from I-80 (in either direction): Take the Central Avenue exit in El Cerrito. Turn east on Central Ave. Proceed a few blocks, past the traffic lights at Pierce St. and Carlson Blvd. to San Pablo Ave, which is another light. Turn left (north) on San Pablo. Proceed north a few blocks, past the light at Stockton Ave. to the next light at Moeser Lane. Turn right (east) on Moeser and proceed up the hill almost to The Arlington. When you come to Terrace Drive on the right, make a sharp right turn (almost a "V") onto Terrace. Avoid the easy right turn at the corner, which is Bates. Proceed southwest down the hill at an angle for one long block. Make a left turn off of Terrace onto Gelston Place. (A sign on the corner says "Not a Through Street.") Proceed one block on Gelston, until you come to a "Y" intersection. Take the right arm of the "Y" onto Bay Tree Lane—a one-block street which goes downhill and ends in a cul-de-sac. The Walentas' house is a redwood house on the right, the third house from the far end of the street. The top of the garage is covered with trumpet vines. If you get lost, call Sue at (510) 526-4383.

# CCC LIBRARY'S PROJECT SECOND CHANCE

Approximately 36 million adults in the United States cannot read or write above a third-grade level. In Contra Costa County, 12% of the population—or 100,00 adults—also struggle with the tasks that most of us take for granted everyday: paying bills, applying for jobs, reading a menu, helping a child with homework, or reading a medicine label.

**Project Second Chance (PSC)** is a free, confidential program in the Contra Costa County library system that offers one-on-one tutoring to adults age 16 or older and out of K-12 who read or write below a sixth-grade level. Tutors are community volunteers, over 21, who are confident in reading and writing. PSC provides 14 hours of free tutor training and unlimited support. Tutoring pairs work twice a week for 90 minutes per session (3 hours/week total) in a public place to work on reading, writing, spelling, and life skills like how to email a child's teacher, write a resume, take the citizenship exam, and so on.

Since 1984, PSC had helped thousands of people reach their literacy goals. You can help by spreading the work about the PSC program. Most of the people that PSC hopes to reach can't read a flyer, but they do hear about the PSC program via word of mouth. Please also consider volunteering to tutor if you have the time or let others know about the opportunity to help.

#### **5 ISSUES WE ARE WATCHING IN 2020**

#### Dear AAUW Members,

As the 2020 presidential campaign gets underway, the power of women is on full display.

Maybe it's that there are so many women in the race — the largest number in history — or because the candidates are eager to earn our support. Whatever the reason, the issues that matter most to us are *finally* getting attention.

As a non-partisan organization, AAUW doesn't endorse specific candidates. But that doesn't mean we're not advocates for the policies that matter most to us. Indeed, we have a long history of championing policies that advance equality for women in education and the workplace.

So, in the months ahead, AAUW will be watching closely to see where candidates stand on these five issues:

- Equal Pay for Equal Work. To close the stubborn wage gap, we need leaders who will pass the federal Paycheck Fairness Act and advocate for laws and policies that ensure women are not discriminated against at work.
- 2. **Investing in Education.** Education is the pathway for women and girls, but too many of our schools are falling short. We need to raise teacher pay, invest in STEM education, protect Title IX and make education a top national priority.
- 3. **Reducing Student Debt.** Women hold two-thirds of the nation's \$1.46 trillion educational debt. Policymakers should protect grant programs, champion tuition- and debt-free options and expand loan forgiveness programs.
- 4. **Strengthening Social Security.** Because of lower wages and time off from work, women collect about \$320 a month less than men do in Social Security benefits. Our lawmakers need to address the retirement wage gap women face.
- 5. **Implementing Paid Leave.** The U.S. is the only developed country without paid family and sick leave. Let's adopt policies to give workers paid time off for illness and caregiving.

You know how much is at stake in the next election. So, please, do what you've done in the past: Tune in, get involved, make your voices heard — and ensure that we harness the power of women to drive the national agenda.
