#### **<u>"SCHOOLS & COMMUNITIES FIRST" INITIATIVE FOR NOVEMBER BALLOT</u>**

California Alliance for Retired Americans (CARA) and several other organizations including the League of Women Voters are working to get the "Schools & Communities First" Initiative on the November Ballot. This historic ballot measure closes the Proposition 13 Corporate Loophole. In 1978 voters passed Proposition 13 to help homeowners, but because of a loophole large commercial property owners avoid paying billions in property taxes because they are still being taxed based on decades old property values. This means that schools and local community services like first responders, senior centers, libraries, parks and health clinics funded by property taxes lose \$11 billion per year in funding. The "Schools & Communities First" Initiative will restore the funding without changing residential or agricultural property taxes while protecting small businesses.

We can use more volunteers to work with the West County schools on the nomination, selection, and processing of the seventh grade girls we will sponsor to attend the 2020 Tech Trek STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Camp at Sonoma State University June 21-27. Let us know if you want to work on the Tech Trek selection team. We also provide a camper orientation/reception at the EC Denny's in early June and the camper follow-up presentations at the September Meeting.

**Tech Trek** continues to be a major program for our Branch. This year we will again be sponsoring **eight girls** from the **WCCUSD Middle Schools** (**Crespi**, **DeJean**, **Helms**, **Hercules**, **Korematsu**, **Pinole**, **Mira Vista**, and **Stewart**). The Branch works closely with the middle school math, science, and computer teachers to identify seventh grade girls who will benefit from the Tech Trek experience. Each nominated girl completes an application, writes an essay, and is interviewed with a parent. For the selected girls, Tech Trek is often life changing.

In addition to selecting the girls, raising the money to send them to camp is very challenging. The amount needed for each **Tech Trek** camper we sponsor is \$1,000 (including the \$50 camper commitment fee). Because of the difficulty in getting regular donations from businesses, we depend more on the generosity of our branch members and family/friends. #### **5 ISSUES AAUW IS WATCHING IN 2020**

- 1. Equal Pay for Equal Work. To close the stubborn wage gap, we need leaders who will pass the federal Paycheck Fairness Act and advocate for laws and policies that ensure women are not discriminated against at work.
- 2. **Investing in Education.** Education is the pathway for women and girls, but too many of our schools are falling short. We need to raise teacher pay, invest in STEM education, protect Title IX and make education a top national priority.
- 3. **Reducing Student Debt.** Women hold two-thirds of the nation's \$1.46 trillion educational debt. Policymakers should protect grant programs, champion tuition- and debt-free options and expand loan forgiveness programs.
- 4. **Strengthening Social Security.** Because of lower wages and time off from work, women collect about \$320 a month less than men do in Social Security benefits. Our lawmakers need to address the retirement wage gap women face.
- 5. **Implementing Paid Leave.** The U.S. is the only developed country without paid family and sick leave. Let's adopt policies to give workers paid time off for illness and caregiving.
