2020-2021 Program: Our Board was able to put together an exciting calendar of monthly virtual meetings through January, 2021 (see page 4). Hopefully, many of you were able to attend. Detail information about Dr. Dembe and her talk is on page 5. For **October** we have two main events. On October 3 at 10:30 a.m. the LWV BAE will present the **California Propositions Pros and Cons**. Then on October 10th and 24th the **AAUW Fund Fellows/Grant recipients will talk**. In **November Ruth Sasaki** will discuss her Topaz Stories Project (rescheduled from April). And in **January Dr. Ruth O. Saxton** will talk about her new book, *"The Book of Old Ladies"*.

Interest Groups: Christine Hills is starting a **new virtual interest group – Tell Your Story!** See write-up page 7. The **first class** will be **Tuesday, October 27, 2020 2-4 pm**. Christine is our Zoom person and is willing to help other members setup virtual meetings for Interest groups. For example, although we can't meet at a restaurant, a group could meet virtually to share recipes / menus.

Proposed 2020-2021 Budget: Review the Board proposed Budget on page 3. We will discuss and approve it at our October 6 Board meeting. There are several changes. We decided not to generate a new Membership Directory and with virtual meetings we decided to reduce the speaker honorarium and hospitality expenses. We will however continue to pay Christ Lutheran Church the room rental fee. We decided we needed to support them. With the uncertainty of the 2021 Tech Trek camps, we didn't budget for the Tech Trek family fee income. Thanks as always for the extra donations through the Adopt-A-Fund Program to supplement our branch dues (\$448) which does not meet our regular expenses (\$2,588). Note there is over \$2,000 in our carryover / reserve. In our discussion of the proposed budget we will also review the 'special buckets' and how these funds should be presented/used.

Thanks for your support. I enjoy working with such special people.



Contra Costa College Scholarship

For many years our branch has awarded the Mary Ellen Bales AAUW scholarship at Contra Costa College to a woman from the Center for Science Excellence with a STEM major in an underrepresented field continuing her education at a four-year college or university. The scholarship was administered by the tax-exempt Contra Costa College (CCC) Foundation.

In a recent audit it was determined that the CCC Foundation gets Federal Funding through the support it gets from the Contra Costa College District. Therefore under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act, all CCC Foundation scholarships must be open to everyone. Since our scholarship is for women only, it can no longer be administered by the CCC Foundation and our account there was closed. The \$1,205 remaining in the account was returned to the branch.

The Board voted to continue this worthwhile endeavor and is now looking into providing the scholarship on our own. Seti Sidharta, a branch member and Director of the Center for Science Excellence at Contra Costa College, has volunteered to administer our scholarship applications at Contra Costa College. We are also applying to the AAUW California Special Projects Fund, a non-profit corporation, to receive tax deductible donations for our local scholarship. We will also have to look at how other local scholarships handle the giving of the money to the recipients. The CCC Foundation worked with the transfer school. Everything is now on hold.

About the Speaker

Dr. Cheryl Sundari Dembe has a BS from The University of Michigan and a MS (1970) and PhD (2018) from The University of Chicago, working in superfluidity. She taught chemistry at Diablo Valley College for 34 years, serving three times as Department Chair, as well as an interim Division Chair of Physical Science and Engineering, hired architects for a Physical Science building, and spent 3 years with them designing it. She also taught at Holy Names College, Laney and College of Marin as well as at UC Berkeley on sabbatical. She was the first woman chemist, first woman Chemistry Department chair, and first woman Physical Science Division chair (interim) at DVC, as well as one of the first women to have children while teaching. She also worked in chemical industry. She authored the ancillary materials for "The World of Chemistry", a 26-episode TV series hosted by Nobel laureate Roald Hoffman. Barred from normal research pathways without the doctorate, she developed 25 original chemical theories applied to life, society and the individual, interwoven at a lay level in the story line of her book, The Choice of Happiness, Glimpses from an Extraordinary Ordinary Scientific Mystical Life by Sundari Dembe. She has been active in music, singing with SF Opera, Oakland Symphony, a global Pineal Toning Choir, and has YouTube music videos, two on chemistry reactions. She has traveled to 45 countries, and been a rancher, and a meditation teacher. She speaks before many groups, has been interviewed on TV and radio, as well as having her story appear in major news publications, including Chemistry World, NPR, Mercury Sun, NYTimes and CBS News.

About her Talk

Dr. Dembe explores supportive educational influences, role models, and historical influences, along with difficult equity issues along her 48-year pathway to the granting of her PhD. The degree was completed in 1971, but blocked from write-up and publication when her advisor died, and those close to her research area refused a woman in their group. In 2000, she discovered that two years after she would have published, very similar parallel research was published, and awarded the Nobel Prize. After contacting Douglas Osheroff, the Nobel laureate, she was encouraged and offered support by him in requesting that The University of Chicago award her the degree. At that point, the letter went unanswered. In 2018, she was inspired by the #MeToo movement to write again, this time with a successful outcome. Her Four Steps used to encourage a correction when unjustly treated, are detailed. They include the importance of dropping anger, viewing the person or institution before you as the solution not the problem, believing that they have the integrity to want to right an error, considering that there is always a win-win solution, offering multiple items that could be satisfactory resolutions, and releasing focus on a specific outcome. This leads to successful results for everyone involved.



All registered voters in California will receive a Vote-by-Mail (VBM) ballot in early October. You have choices for using that ballot:

- Complete it and mail it in if you do this, mail early. Ballots must be postmarked by Nov 3. They
 have 17 days after that date to reach the Registrar's office, but the postmark must be by Nov 3. If
 you put it in a mailbox on Nov 3 it will not be postmarked in time. Be early!
- 2) Complete the ballot and drop it in an official drop box. Your Registrar of Voters will post locations of drop boxes. The Registrar regularly collects the ballots from the boxes.
- 3) Take your completed ballot to a Vote Center and hand it in. You don't have to use the VBM ballot. You can vote in person and just hand in your unused ballot at a Vote Center.

The **AAUW California Public Policy Committee** has reviewed the 12 propositions that will be on the November 3 ballot and is making a **SUPPORT** recommendation on the following 7 that relate to our priorities and mission:

- Prop 14 Stem Cell Research (access to quality health care)
- Prop 15 Property Taxes (funding for education)
- Prop 16 Affirmative Action (educational opportunity; social justice)
- Prop 17 Voting for Parolees (expansion of voting rights)
- Prop 18 Voting at 17 (encourages voting)
- Prop 21 Rent Control (affordable housing)
- Prop 25 Cash Bail (social & economic justice)



A victory for Equal Pay! AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund plaintiff Aileen Rizo's eight-year legal battle ended in July when the U.S. Supreme Court let a lower court decision— that employers cannot use salary history as a reason for paying men more than women—stand.
