About the Speaker

Nancy Falk is a Research Fellow in Cleaning R&D at the **Clorox** Company, based in Pleasanton, where she develops and leads strategic technology platforms. Previously, she worked in Laundry R&D at Unilever in Edgewater, NJ, where she developed a number of laundry products. Nancy is an inventor on 17 granted US patents. She recently authored a chapter on "Chlorine and Chlorine Compounds" in the just-released 6th edition of "Block's Disinfection, Sterilization, and Disinfection." Last year, she presented and published a short review on surfactants as antimicrobials for the Surfactants in Solution conference. She's also Senior Associate Editor for the Journal of Surfactants and Detergents, and served a term as Member At Large for the Colloid and Surface Science Division at ACS.

About her Talk

Nancy will talk about her journey from her childhood in a rural Washington state community through her education and her technical career in the cleaning products industry, touching on some relevant technologies used in the industry. She will also reflect on work-life balance, technical society roles, outreach, and mentoring.

Public Policy Bill Updates

SB973 Signed by the Governor!

In 2018, AAUW co-sponsored a bill requiring companies with more than 100 employees to collect and report to the Department of Fair Employment and Housing data on:

- 1. The number of employees by race, ethnicity, and sex for 10 job categories;
- 2. The number of employees by race, ethnicity, and sex, whose annual earnings fall within certain pay bands:
- 3. The total number of hours worked by each employee counted in each pay band during the reporting vear.

The purpose of the bill is "to allow for designated state agencies to collect wage data to more efficiently identify wage patterns and allow for targeted enforcement of equal pay or discrimination laws." The bill failed in 2019, and was re-introduced last year by the same author, Senator Hannah-Beth Jackson (D-Santa Barbara), and was signed by Governor Newsom on September 30th – the last day in the last hour!

Fifteen other AAUW California-supported bills were also signed by the Governor, including: improved medical care for incarcerated pregnant women (AB732); protection for women testifying in sexual assault cases from having their testimony of alcohol or drug use at the time of the assault used against them in a separate prosecution (AB1927); addition of "sexual harassment" as a form of prohibited sex discrimination in higher education (SB493); and expansion of the California Family Rights Act to require any employer with 5 or more employees to grant a request by an employee to take up to 12 workweeks of unpaid protected leave during any 12-month period to bond with a new child or to care for themselves or a child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner (SB1383).

Finally, as part of our "white allyship" posture, we are proud to have supported six bills that were enacted to address racial injustice and/or to enhance opportunities for Black women: AB979, requiring corporations to include a specified number of members from underrepresented communities on their boards of directors; AB1196 and AB1506, regulating police use of force; AB1460, requiring ethnic studies as a graduation requirement in CSU schools; AB3070, addressing discriminatory use of peremptory challenges in jury selection; and AB3121, reparation establishing a task force to study and develop proposals.

 - Aggie. A documentary that "explores the nexus of art, race, and justice through the story of art collector and philanthropist Agnes 'Aggie' Gund's life." In making this film, Aggie's daughter's aim was to "give viewers an understanding of the power of art to transform consciousness and inspire social change."
 - Herb Alpert Is... A Q&A with Grammy-winner Herb Alpert moderated by Grammy Museum Artistic director, Scott Goldman.
 - The Keeper. "A young English woman and a soccer-playing German POW overcome prejudice, public hostility and personal tragedy near the end of World War II." This movie received a critics' score of 99% on Rotten Tomatoes.
 - The Disrupted. A documentary about 3 working class Americans who have fallen through the cracks in our economy: a Kansas farmer, an Ohio factory worker, and an Uber driver in Florida.
 "Ultimately, THE DISRUPTED reveals a collective American experience of financial challenge, family resilience, and the quest for the purpose and dignity of work. "
 - Artist's Wife. This drama about the former painter and wife of a celebrated artist explores how she deals with her husband's dementia in regard to both the art community and their family. Starring Lena Olin, Bruce Dern
 - A Chef's Voyage. This documentary follows Chef David Kinch and his team from Manresa, their Michelin 3-Star restaurant in California, through collaborations with chefs in Paris, Provfence and Marseille. In English and French with English subtitles.
 - *RBG*. A documentary exploring Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg's life and legacy, from Betsy West and Julie Cohen. 100% of the ticket price will go to the ACLU Women's Rights Project founded by Justice Ginsburg in 1972.

- Jimmy Carter: Rock & Roll President. This documentary explains how Carter's tight bonds with musicians such as Willie Nelson, Bob Dylan and the Allman Brothers helped him win the Democratic nomination for President in 1976, despite being low on campaign funds and lacking name recognition. It examines the role of music throughout Carter's life, during and after his presidency. Includes interviews with Bob Dylan, Willie Nelson, Paul Simon, Gregg Allman, Garth Brooks, and Bono.
- Our Time Machine. "Shaken by the news of his father's dementia, artist Maleonn creates 'Papa's Time Machine,' a wondrous time-travel adventure performed on stage with life-size mechanical puppets. Through the play's production, he confronts his own mortality. Maleonn finds grace and unexpected joy in this moving meditation on art, the agonies of love and loss, and the circle of life."
