The mission of **Make El Cerrito Fire Safe** is to keep El Cerrito fire safe by advocating for and working toward the reduction of the fuel load on public and private property, to create clearly marked and passable evacuation routes and to educate the public about and to motivate them to fire harden their structures and create defensible space around their homes. Almost half of El Cerrito geographically and all of Kensington is designated as a Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone, VHFHSZ, by Cal Fire.

HEAR DR. JILLIAN R. SANZONE'S TALK: Merck Research Laboratories In South San Francisco – Discovery Chemistry At Merck In The Bay Area

About the Speaker

Dr. Jillian R. Sanzone received her B.A. from New York University in Chemistry. She went on to earn her Ph.D. in 2018 at New York University under the advisement of Professor K. A. Woerpel working on the development of new synthetic reactions involving strained cyclic alkenes. In 2018, she relocated to San Francisco and started working in the Discovery Chemistry group at Merck Research Laboratories in South San Francisco, CA. Her current work includes inventing new small molecule drugs for the treatment of metabolic diseases and designing novel synthetic methods to enable medicinal chemistry programs at Merck.

Abstract

In this talk, Dr. Sanzone will highlight the new Merck Research Laboratories site in South San Francisco, CA. Merck is a global healthcare company headquartered in New Jersey focusing on oncology, vaccines, infectious diseases, COVID-19 treatments, and cardiometabolic diseases. The Merck discovery hub in South San Francisco was established in 2017 and has grown to over 200 employees in the newly designed 290,000 square foot research and office space. The South San Francisco site focuses on developing treatments for cardiometabolic diseases and oncology. The Discovery Chemistry group enables these goals by leveraging the strong chemistry and scientific expertise at Merck to focus on discovering better molecules faster across modalities and advancing the best molecules into the pipeline to deliver to patients.

AAUW Board of Directors Statement on Open Membership

The AAUW National Board of Directors strongly supports elimination of the degree requirement for membership and will put the requirement up for a membership vote this spring. This important change is a critical step in bringing AAUW's bylaws and membership requirement in line with our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. While AAUW is fiercely committed to educational attainment for all women, given our commitment to inclusion, this is simply the right thing to do.

Proposals to eliminate the degree requirement for membership have come before the membership for vote a number of times. The Board feels very strongly that, while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement is now counter to our mission and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization.

Now through February 5, 2021, 5:00 p.m. ET, you can provide thoughts and comments on the proposed changes to the AAUW bylaws as well as proposed changes to the Public Policy Priorities. 2020-2021 BUDGET UPDATE

No adjustments need to be made to the 2020-2021 Budget. There is enough money to cover expenses for the rest of the year. We also know that our budgeted expenses will be less because of the continued restriction on in-person meetings. When the 2020-2021 Budget was developed changes were made. We decided not to generate a new Membership Directory and with virtual meetings, we decided to reduce the speaker honorarium and hospitality expenses. We decided however to continue to pay Christ Lutheran Church the room rental fee. Also with the uncertainty of the 2021 Tech Trek camps, we didn't budget for the Tech Trek family fee income. Thanks to the extra donations through the Adopt-A-Fund Program (\$1,990) we are able to supplement our branch dues (\$544) to help meet our budgeted expenses (\$2,588).

At the February 2 Board meeting we will discuss our branch income ("Adopt-A-Fund") and how we fund our expenses. The discussion will include the restricted funds ("special buckets") in our budget. Note there is over \$2,000 in our carryover / reserve. We will be reviewing our income as we put together plans for the 2021-2022 Membership Renewal.

The restricted funds are:

- <u>Contra Costa College Scholarship</u>: Balance in our CCC Foundation account when our scholarship could no longer be sponsored by CCC. Money will go into new account when scholarship is reactivated.
- <u>Scholarship Fund</u>: Donations to WCC scholarship fund (\$1,500 bequest from Leslie O'Hara) money used to supplement Tech Trek and CCC scholarships and for speaker donations.
- <u>Special Projects</u>: Money left over from last Math Science Conference and speaker honorarium donation.
- <u>"Let's Go" Fund</u>: Money earned years ago from sale of "Let's Go" booklet. Used to fund special activities / projects with approval. Note in WCC Policies and Procedures says "a balance of at least \$2,500should be maintained for financing major projects of the branch"

NOTICE OF NATIONAL DUES ADJUSTMENT

At its October 16, 2020, meeting, the AAUW National Board of Directors voted to increase Individual Member dues for the next three years. The dues will rise by \$3 for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022, \$5 for FY 2023 and \$5 for FY 2024, making the total dues amount for those years \$62, \$67 and \$72, respectively. All but \$3 of your annual dues remains tax deductible. (CA State \$20 and WCC Branch \$16 dues remain the same)

This decision wasn't made lightly. The board members couldn't be more grateful for our members — or prouder of the work you've done this year. We also recognize that all of us are navigating numerous challenges in these uncertain times. However, in order to preserve the viability of this organization we all love, the board needed to take action. Simply put, this measure is essential for AAUW to continue our mission to achieve gender equity.

Most nonprofits adjust their dues annually or every other year to keep pace with inflation and rising expenses. However, due to prudent budgetary management, AAUW has been able to keep its dues flat since July 2018. That means that, by the time the first scheduled increase takes effect, we will have maintained three years of dues stability.

Moreover, in recognition of the difficult economy we're in, the board planned for the initial adjustment to be the most modest. Over the course of the year, it works out to be only an additional 25 cents per month — what we hope is a small price to pay for maintaining our important work and community.
